The cultural and creative sectors play a crucial role in societal development, serving as powerful drivers of economic, social and cultural growth. They create numerous jobs, stimulate innovation and entrepreneurship, and contribute to community engagement. By enhancing the attractiveness of cities and regions, these sectors also invigorate local economies. Additionally, they contribute to personal development by fostering critical thinking, problem-solving skills and emotional intelligence. In my presentation, I will introduce various EU support tools, including the Cultural and Creative Cities Monitor.

Large scale events such as the ECoC usually focus on creating impact and becoming 'pulsar events' for cities. As the ECoC has developed, however, more attention has been paid to longer-term legacies. This presentation examines the legacies of ECoC events over the longer term and examines the different forms of value that are delivered for stakeholders. While the measurement of immediate impacts is often centered on instrumental value creation in the form of tourism, legacy planning should lead to increased intrinsic and institutional value creation that builds a platform for future cultural development.

WHAT DOES THE DATA SHOW?

During the year 2023, the Veszprém-Balaton 2023 European Capital of Culture programme enlivened the everyday life of Veszprém and the Bakony-Balaton region with over 3.600 events in 24 genres, with the participation of more than 500 partners and 116 municipalities. There are innumerable and unforgettable memories of the ECoC programme year – but what does the data show? What good practices and achievements has the short-term evaluation of the ECoC programme highlighted? What are the long-term social, environmental and cultural impacts of the partnerships developed? What monitoring tools can be used to help ensure the lasting vitality of the creative region's ecosystem? We seek to answer these and many similar questions at our conference by reviewing data from the Veszprém-Balaton 2023 and Timisoara 2023 ECoC programmes.

ACCOMPANYING PROGRAMMES



ROMANI FOR BERHIDA 19.30 Wednesday, 11th September

In 2022 and 2023, the project Romani for Berhida was implemented under the European Capital of Culture Veszprém-Balaton 2023 programme, led by Erika Varga and Helena Varga, founding designers of Romani Design. Based on education and community building, the project targeted the 1,500-strong Roma community in and around Berhida, most of whom live in difficult circumstances, and provided music therapy and talent management, sewing, fashion design and styling sessions for a total of around 200 children on a weekly basis. In the local nursery and primary schools and in the community centre. specialists, development teachers and artists helped to nurture the talents of the young people.

As part of the programme, a music and dance group, a community children's orchestra, was formed, consisting of children and young people from Berhida, who continue to perform after the programme's closure, with the knowledge and values acquired during the sessions. These young talents are now presenting the conference with a short music and dance performance on the first day of the event.

RESOURCE HUB COMMUNITY OFFICE CEREMONIAL OPENING

The Hungarian Development Promotion Office and the University of Pannonia have created a new community space at 25 Old Town Square in the centre of Veszprém, which invites cultural and creative industry players from the city and the region to meet and think together. The office will offer the opportunity to participate in various training courses related to the creative industries and to collaborate with educational institutions, as well as information on direct EU funding, tenders, project planning and business development.

MILLENNIUM MONUMENT RE-INAUGURATION

16.00 Thursday, 12th September

The Millennium Monument was created to commemorate the 1000th anniversary of the founding of the Hungarian state, by Mária Lugossy, Munkácsy Mihály Award-winning Meritorious Artist. The work, erected by the Municipality of Veszprém, is a time gate symbolising the sense of identity of the Hungarian people that has crystallised over a thousand years of history. It is a transparent prism that receives and transmits sacral light; this is the essence of the work, both in content and form. The monument used to stand in Old Town Square before it was removed and restored in 2023.
